By reinterpreting 20th-century poetry as a listening to and writing through noise, *The Poetics of Noise from Dada to Punk* constructs a literary history of noise through poetic sound and performance. This book traces how poets figure noise in the disfiguration of poetic voice. Materializing in the threshold between the heard and the unheard, noise emerges in the differentiation and otherness of sound. It arises in the folding of an "outside" into the "inside" of poetic performance both on and off the page. Through a series of case studies ranging from verse by ear-witnesses to the First World War, Dadaist provocations, jazz modernist song and poetry, early New York City punk rock, contemporary sound poetry, and noise music, *The Poetics of Noise from Dada to Punk* describes productive failures of communication that theorize listening against the grain of sound's sense.

François Szabó has put together an impressive collection of short poems entitled 'Punk Poems' whose strengths, like punk rock, are directness and simplicity and a lack of adornment. Unlike punk rock

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however Szabó's poems are surprisingly non-urban, with many references to nature, the stars and everyday life. The result is non-lyrical, but with many lyrical themes. The poems deal with a wide range of emotions, from despair and loneliness to joy and optimism for the future. There is a haiku quality to many of the poems, which allows the reader to make the connection between the poetry of Zen, the poetry of the beat generation, and the poetry of punk music. A 2018 Pura Belpré Author Honor Book *The First Rule of Punk* is a wry and heartfelt exploration of friendship, finding your place, and learning to rock out like no one's watching. There are no shortcuts to surviving your first day at a new school—you can't fix it with duct tape like you would your Chuck Taylors. On Day One, twelve-year-old Malú (María Luisa, if you want to annoy her) inadvertently upsets Posada Middle School's queen bee, violates the school's dress code with her punk rock look, and disappoints her college-professor mom in the process. Her dad, who now lives a thousand miles away, says things will get better as long as she remembers the first rule of punk: be

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yourself. The real Malú loves rock music, skateboarding, zines, and Soyrizo (hold the cilantro, please). And when she assembles a group of like-minded misfits at school and starts a band, Malú finally begins to feel at home. She'll do anything to preserve this, which includes standing up to an anti-punk school administration to fight for her right to express herself!
