What here shall miss, our toil shall strive to mend. The prologue is a sonnet with 14 lines of iambic pentameter in an ABAB CDCD EFEF GG rhyme scheme. It sets the scene for the play by hinting at most of the action to come. It describes the setting and basic conflict in the first stanza of four lines.

The Prologue is a key element in how our expectations of the outcome of the tragedy of Romeo and Juliet are handled. The Prologue, which was often delivered by an authorial character (see Gower in *Pericles*, Quince in *Midsummer Night's Dream*) served to establish audience expectation in Shakespeare's theatre for an audience with few preconceptions of this individual story but a complex understanding of the tropes of Renaissance tragedy.
